## A profile of its children

**Understanding the facts about children in New York illustrates why smart, proven investments in New York's children and youth are critical to protecting New York's competitive edge in a global market place.**

### Children in New York<sup>1</sup>

- 4,286,008 children (under the age of 18) live in the state;
- 951,000 children (23%) live in poverty (about \$22,800 or less for a family of four);
- 433,000 children (10%) live in extreme poverty (about \$11,400 or less for a family of four);
- 36 percent of children live in a household with only one parent.

### Early Childhood<sup>2</sup>

- Approximately 43,775 children participate in the federally-funded Head Start program. However;
- Only 15 percent of 3-year-olds and 60 percent of 4-year-olds were enrolled in state-funded pre-kindergarten, Head Start or a special education preschool program;
- 62 percent of children under the age of 6 have both or their only parent in the work force.

### School Readiness<sup>3</sup>

- Math:
  - 64 percent of fourth graders are below grade level in math;
  - 70 percent of eighth graders are below grade level in math.
- Reading:
  - 65 percent of fourth graders are reading below grade level;
  - 65 percent of eighth graders are reading below grade level.

### Graduation Rates<sup>4</sup>

- 23 percent of high school students do not graduate on time with a high school diploma;
- These rates are worse for youth of color:
  - 36 percent of African-Americans do not graduate on time;
  - 37 percent of Latinos do not graduate on time.
