A profile of its children

Understanding the facts about children in Washington illustrates why smart, proven investments in Washington's children and youth are critical to protecting Washington's competitive edge in a global market place.

Children in Washington State¹

- Almost 1.6 million children (under the age of 18) live in the state;
- 284,000 children (18%) live in poverty (about \$22,100 or less for a family of four);
- 122,000 children (8%) live in extreme poverty (about \$11,000 or less for a family of four);
- 29 percent of children live in a household with only one parent.

Early Childhood²

- 11,600 children participate in the federally-funded Head Start program. However;
- Only 10 percent of 3-year-olds and 20 percent of 4-year-olds were enrolled in state-funded pre-kindergarten, Head Start or a special education preschool program;
- 60 percent of children under the age of 6 have both or their only parent in the work force.

School Readiness³

- Math:
 - 55 percent of fourth graders are below grade level in math;
 - 60 percent of eighth graders are below grade level in math.
- Reading:
 - 66 percent of fourth graders are reading below grade level;
 - 63 percent of eighth graders are reading below grade level.

Graduation Rates⁴

- 34 percent of high school students do not graduate on time with a high school diploma;
- These rates are worse for youth of color:
 - 54 percent of African-Americans do not graduate on time;
 - 49 percent of Latinos do not graduate on time.
